Dear Friends of NCSR,

It's that time to give you an update on our year-to-date intake of rescued Shelties. So far this year we have received eleven Shelties with an average age of six years. Three came from animal shelters, with the remaining eight surrendered by their owners for a variety of reasons. At the start of the year our Special Needs program had eight sweet Shelties, but we recently lost three of these darling dogs: Boomer, Bonnie and Buddy. We are so grateful for the loving care provided by their foster moms. Paula cared for Boomer (from August of 2022, died at age 14) and Jean cared for Bonnie and Buddy (March of 2022, died at ages 15.5 and 16). This is tough work due to the intense nature of the bond created from caring for the frail and infirm.

As you know we hold an annual Sheltie Celebration in mid May, typically the Saturday following Mother's Day. Our wonderful venue, Performance Dogs In Action in the Sacramento area, will likely be sold by the time May rolls around. We are looking for another site to hold it on, preferably a central location for our adopters and supporters to access. It could be a public location or someone's large home/property and it doesn't have to be in May. If you have any ideas for location, please let us know!

Fundraising Campaign

Dear Sheltie friends:

Please take a look at the photos within this letter and you'll grasp immediately the purpose of our reaching out to you for help. What do these dogs have in common? They're all currently in the Special Needs Program of NorCal Sheltie Rescue, with the exception of Scooter, who was rescued in 2006, and Boomer who died in September of 2024.

NorCal Sheltie Rescue's Special Needs program is dedicated to providing high quality lives to dogs that require extensive medical care and attention. We are very proud of this program because we accept virtually all Shetland Sheepdogs into our care. Medically-challenged or senior dogs are placed in private homes with experienced volunteers, advised and monitored by our rescue team. As of today we have five Special Needs Shelties in our program: Gabby, Hershey, Sequin, Snickers, and Teddy.

As you are well aware, veterinary expenses have increased dramatically. In 2006, Scooter's broken leg surgery was \$2,300. In 2023, the average cost of caring for our special needs Shelties was over \$2,000. Snickers' care alone now totals \$7,559. We often take in dogs that need to be spayed or neutered and require dentals; the combined cost easily exceeds \$1,000. For example, expenses for two recent intakes Sky and Star totaled \$2,484 and \$2,743, respectively. Examinations, treatments, procedures, surgeries, prescription medications, and prescription foods are all essential in order to provide them with quality lives.

Over the past twenty years, we've been very successful at achieving our mission of rescuing, rehabilitating, and re-homing Shelties in need. We've saved 799 Shelties! As a nonprofit 501c3 organization, we've relied on donations and legacy gifts to operate. But our funds have gradually decreased and we are worried.

We are launching a campaign to generate funds for our ailing veterinary account, scheduled for **Dec. 3**, **2024**, **the National Day of Giving, through Dec. 31**, **2024**. Would you please consider making a financial donation to NorCal Sheltie Rescue? Each and every dollar goes toward veterinary expenses for the dogs in our program. We hope to reach our goal of **\$100,000** for **2024**, which would allow us to continue our mission into and through 2025.

Ritchie's Story

Many of you aleady know Ritchie, based on his appearance on our website, our Facebook page, and on Petfinder. His journey has been remarkable and his good nature intractable throughout the long process from the shelter he came from and the perfect place he now calls home. He came into our program as a stray, large, powerful, intact, with no training, no social skills, and no manners. Our foster mom, Wendy, picked him up from the shelter, got him neutered and vetted, and did some preliminary training with him. Unfortunately, he intimidated her cat. In his second home, his adopter Carol worked with a trainer and made some progress with him, but he overpowered her on walks due to his predatory drive and reactivity to other dogs. Desperate for another home, we posted Ritchie's second plea:

Dear people,

It's me again: Ritchie! I'm still waiting for my forever home! Remember, I was a stray, wandering the streets and picked up by a shelter. NorCal Sheltie Rescue took me in and they're looking for just the right home for me. Here's a list of my positive qualities:

- Young
- Healthy
- Handsome
- Housetrained
- Crate trained
- Neutered
- Microchipped
- Up to date with vaccinations
- Sleep through the night
- Gentle with food and treats
- Affectionate

I'm still learning, though, and I would love to go to dog school. An experienced owner could really help me become the dog I want to be. Here's what I'm working on:

- Walking on leash
- Paying attention to owner
- Not reacting to distractions

As I said before in my first post, my best quality is that I love people and I'm very free with my affection. My ideal home has a large fenced yard, no other pets, no young children (I might want to chase them), and people who are willing to train me. I promise to give back lots of love in return. 
IT DOESN'T HAPPEN OVERNIGHT

If a tree falls in the forest and no one's around to see it, a Sheltie 500 miles away, will bark at it.








